P.7 Post Primary Transfer Process

If your child was born between 2 July 2009 and 1 July 2010, they will be due to start post-primary school in September 2021.

The online application will be open between 12 noon on Monday 1 March 2021 and 4pm on Tuesday 16 March 2021. Please note that this is not a first come first served basis and post-primary schools will only begin to make decisions on applications after the closing date for applications has passed.

Your child's primary school will share with you an electronic copy of the key information leaflet 'Applying for a post-primary school place' in the coming weeks. This leaflet and further guidance will be accessible on this website to assist you in making an online application.

It is the responsibility of the Board of Governors of each school to determine the admissions criteria to be used in the event of oversubscription.

The admissions criteria for post primary schools are now available https://www.eani.org.uk/search-schools. Before you start your application it is very important that you read the admissions criteria of all the schools you are interested in sending your child to.

The online application is very straight-forward to complete and you will be guided through each page. In addition to the guidance videos and documents on the EA website, the Admissions Helpdesk will be available for digital assistance if you need it.

If you are unable to apply online, paper applications will only be available on request from the Education Authority.

Please find enclosed a link to an information leaflet, 'Applying for a Post-Primary School Place'. The layout of the leaflet is different this year as it is electronic. A plain text version of the leaflet is currently being translated and it will be available on the EA website early next week in the following languages: Irish, Polish, Portuguese, Lithuanian, Romanian, Arabic and Tetum. Have a look at the key messages that are important for parents to be aware of when applying for a post-primary place.

We would encourage parents to use of the guidance on completing the online Post-Primary Application. A 'Post Primary Application Tutorial Video – Desktop View' providing a step-by-step guide to the online application is now available and a mobile phone view will follow shortly. Key Messages

- The post-primary application will be accessible at www.eani.org.uk/admissions and the application opening window is between 12 noon on Monday 1 March and 4pm on Tuesday 16 March 2021.
- It is the responsibility of parents to check that all relevant information is included on their child's application before submitting the form.
- Digital assistance is available via the Admissions Helpdesk 028 9598 5595 in addition to the user guides on our website and the guidance leaflet 'Applying for a Post-Primary School Place'.
- Using the Recite Me tool on the EA website, parents can translate information and access audio transcripts of admissions criteria and our guidance materials in a range of languages. Parents may watch our subtitled video in six different languages and access translated versions of the P7 leaflet.
- Parents can check if their child would be eligible for transport assistance to a particular school on the EA website.
- Parents have the right to express school preferences but no child can be guaranteed a place at any particular school. More than half of post-primary schools are oversubscribed and not all children who apply will receive a place at an oversubscribed school. To ensure the best chance of getting their child into a post-primary school of their choice, it is strongly recommended that at least four schools are listed in the order of preference and include at least one non-grammar school. Parents

can list as many schools as they wish and in some areas where many of the schools are oversubscribed, it may be wise to list more than four schools. Up to 12 schools can be listed on the online application.

- It is important that parents find out the following information about the schools they are considering. This will help them to assess if their child is likely to be offered a place:-
- 1. the admissions criteria sets out how the school will decide which children will be selected/not selected if the school is oversubscribed. Parents should think about how well their child meets the criteria. The admissions criteria for all schools can be found on the EA website. If parents have questions about what something in a particular school's criteria means they can contact the school for clarification.
- 2. the number of applications the school received in previous years and the number of pupils who were accepted. This information is included with the school's criteria on the EA website to let parents know if the school is usually oversubscribed.



Reading at home



It is important to keep reading at home during Lock Down. The children in Mrs Turley's class may receive reading books in their packs as at this young age it is vital for them to continue learning such as concepts of print.

Concepts of Print refers to the awareness of 'how print works'. This includes the knowledge of the concept of what books, print, and written language are, and how they function. It encompasses a number of understandings that allow the reading process to take place including:

- understanding that print conveys a message
- knowledge about book orientation and directionality of print, and
- distinction between sentences, words and letters, and
- knowledge of the alphabetic system and the difference between letters and words.

Through exposure to shared book reading in early childhood, and through modelled, shared, and guided reading in the early years, children develop these important concepts of print.

Children in P4-7 will be directed towards reading books they have at home or from the following two websites:

Children in P4-7 should remember the skills and strategies they have previously learnt on how to work out unknown words such as to look for small words they already know inside the big word, to break it into syllables, to read on and come back to it or to start the sentence again and look at the pictures for clues. P 4&5 have a 'Read at Home' book uploaded to the Home Learning section of the website for the children to read and enjoy at home.

Background Information:

Water, Water everywhere but can you drink it all

Water is something we all take for granted. We just turn on the tap and it appears but we don't often think of how much water we actually use.

Only around 1% of earth's water is fresh water suitable for us to drink and even then this must be collected and cleaned to make it safe for us to use.

In Northern Ireland we are very lucky we just have to turn on the tap to use clean, safe water and we often use a lot more than we think.

We don't measure how much we use each time and if are asked how much water we use a day we often have to guess.

NI Water clean around 585 million litres of water every day and we each use approximately 150 litres a day but much of this is wasted.

Climate change, global warming and increased populations have all put pressure on our water supplies so it is important that we work together to reduce the amount of water we waste to ensure a safe supply for the future.

Top tips for saving water

Bathroom

- ☐ Toilet flushing is very important and is one of the biggest uses of water. A larger handle flush cistern can use up to 9 litres to flush. Putting a Save a Flush Bag in these cisterns can save as much as 2 litres per flush.
- A smaller button flush cistern uses 6 litres per flush for the large button and 3 litres per flush for the small button. Always make sure you push the right button!
- Do you have a leaky loo? A leaky loo isn't always easy to spot but it can waste up to 400 litres per day!! To find out if your loo is leaking contact NI Water for your free leaky loo strip.
- ☐ Fix those drips- a dripping tap can waste approximately 15 litres of water per day that's 5,500 litres per year or enough to fill up 5 ½ fire engines
- Have a short shower instead of a bath- A bath uses an average of 80 litres compared to a 35 litres for a 5 minute shower.
- Why not take our 4 minute shower challenge and reduce your water use even further, sing your favourite song or contact NI Water for your free 4 minute shower timer.
- Reducing your shower time by just 2 minutes can save around 100 litres of water a week, that's enough for 40 thirst quenching glasses of water.
- ☐ Do you remember to turn the tap off while brushing your teeth? Leaving the tap running while your brushing wastes 6 litres per minute so leaving it running for 2 minutes wastes 12 litres = 24 litres per day, 168 litres per week or 8736 per year.

Kitchen

- A washing machine uses approximately 60 litres of water so remember to fully load it. Did you know putting a full load in the washing machine instead of 2 half loads can save 80 litres of water?
- ☐ Fully load the dishwasher: A dishwasher uses about 40 litres of water and remember no need to rinse before putting into the dishwasher simply scrape any leftover into the food bin.
- ☐ Tap water is one of the healthiest refreshing drinks and it is important we keep well hydrated instead of letting the tap run to get cold water keep a jug of water in the fridge. Running the tap to get cold water can waste 3 litres of water each time. In the garden
- Using a hose for 15 minutes uses approximately 135 litres of water so when watering the plants use a watering can instead.
- ☐ Fill up your watering can using rain water collected in a waterbutt you could even use this water to wash the car.

■ Power hoses can use as much as 500 litres of water in just 15 minutes that's enough water for a family of 4 for a full day! So wash the car with a bucket and sponge not a hose
